THIS YEAR'S SHOWHOUSE BY LYNDA REEVES AND ARCHITECT GORDON RIDGELY OFFERS A MASTER CLASS IN CROWD-PLEASING DESIGN.


Everyone has a different idea of a dream home. For every fantasy of a palatial estate, there's the desire for someplace sleek and modern. But it's safe to say that no one would be disappointed to win the 2010 Princess Margaret Hospital showhome, a testament to casual elegance and classic style.

After last year's exercise in rustic minimalism, Lynda Reeves opted for an altogether different direction. Her concept is familiar to seaside destinations such as the Hamptons, Cape Cod and Chester, N.S., where cedarshingle exteriors, inviting verandas and gabled roofs not only define the picturesque homes there but shape universal notions of a beautiful life. Wisely, given this home's location on a leafy corner of Bentley Road in Oakville, Ont. – and not an oceanfront perch – the translation isn't literal. Working closely with renowned

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

a grand reception hall. *Piano, Robert Lowrey's.* RIGHT: The dining room tempers matching chintz upholstery and drapes with a dark table and simple iron chandelier. architect Gordon Ridgely, builder PCM and landscape designer Ronald Holbrook, all Toronto-based, Lynda and the H&H team created a property that blends into the neighbourhood while accomplishing what the best showhomes do, well, best: present a model for fresh ideas and current styles. "We needed to update the classic look so it wouldn't be precious," says Lynda of the 6,500-square-foot home. "We made it edgier."

Ridgely, best known for his fine Georgian residences, focused on drawing from the Hamptons vernacular without being exact. "The house has a pleasant cottagelike feel with some beach-house undercurrents," he says. First and foremost, though, it's a family home. Stepping through the front door reveals a renewed interest in a traditional floor plan, albeit with a twist. Here, rooms are defined, but not closed in: the wide front foyer quickly opens onto both the dining and living areas, creating an

airy great room framed by french doors that take full advantage of the corner lot's beautifully landscaped gardens, courtesy of Coivic Contracting. Tweaking the layout just so emphasizes the importance of openness and light; the cathedral ceiling, complemented by a juliet balcony, adds to the impact.

White walls with crown mouldings and ebony-stained European oak floors anchor the principal rooms, but colour – used as an accent in patterns and as solids – is what truly brings the space to life. Less predictable than au courant orange or fail-safe blue, quince green suggests a fresh and versatile choice, especially when paired with dark grey. It appears again in the principal bedroom, adding zest to a neutral scheme of natural linen and chunky jute. Shocks of geranium red in the sunroom signal a modern twist on Victorian and plantation themes. The study, meanwhile, is designed to be cosy, with club chairs scaled down for maximum seating. Highgloss paint reinforces a luxe, masculine CONTINUED ON PAGE 174

sensibility while adding a hit of glamour.

The most dramatic statement, however, is reserved for the kitchen. which is self-contained and represents a departure from the open-concept live-in kitchens that have been trendy, perhaps beyond their prime. What it lacks is as telling as its many attributes. Consider the absence of an island, which Lynda says is deliberate. "Islands have been in for so long, it's time for the pendulum to swing the other way," she says. With its massive Viking range, built-in bar area and rustic farmhouse table, the kitchen is designed for the love of food and drink. Its assertive grey and stainless steel scheme – tempered by a white beadboard ceiling – is chic by any standard. "Grey is an important neutral in fashion right now, and there's a strong correlation in design," notes Lynda.

Up on the second floor, the message is traditional and pretty. To accommodate the cathedral ceiling on the main floor, the ceilings upstairs had to be lower. Tall mirrors and dressers are used to emphasize the cosier height and reinforce a cottage feel, while layers of prints - on drapes, bedding and upholstery - are mixed and matched to lovely effect. Visual details are myriad: louvered closet doors in the children's room add texture, crystal knobs in the principal dressing area inject sparkle. A mansard mirror above the principal bed brings architectural flair. These are what elevate the house beyond a beach aesthetic. Look even closer and discreet details that ease everyday life emerge, such as lined drawers for jewelry and a Blue Vision Mirror TV in the principal bathroom that only appears when it's on. Music is piped throughout the house by a sound system from Radiant Audio Designs that features invisible speakers hidden behind the walls for a truly seamless look.

Practical needs have been addressed in a similarly thoughtful fashion. A spacious mudroom can be accessed from the kitchen, basement and front and back entrances and boasts closets, cubbyholes and a shallow footbath (for boots or pets). Two staircases lead to the finished basement, allowing easy access to the media room or privacy for a houseguest staying in the lower guest suite. The pale green laundry room is a dream space for this household task, complete with Miele front-loading washer and dryer, generous counter space, a desk area, a massive sink and a Miele mangle rotary iron that presses sheets like a pasta machine. Every item, gadget, appliance and piece of furniture even the infrared Sauna Ray sauna, which turns the basement bathroom into a personal spa – was generously donated or made available at cost.

Although there is only one winning ticket, likely drawn by the time you read this, the showhouse offers countless design ideas that visitors have been able to see, touch and eventually interpret into their own spaces. Fans of the inspirational homes in director Nancy Meyers' modern fairy tale films will recognize a similar feeling in this house. Take the Welsh dresser in the showhouse dining room, which is Lynda's direct nod to a scene in the movie Something's Gotta Give, when stars Jack Nicholson and Diane Keaton spar over dinner in her Hamptons home. "Nancy's houses strike a chord," says Lynda. "There's a level of sophistication that looks expensive but is accessible. It's a woman's house that men would still be comfortable in." But the showhouse is much more than a plush set in a feel-good movie: it's a feel-great prize that will likely prove a lifechanging dream come true.
